THE TRADITION OF LESSONS AND CAROLS

The service of Lessons and Carols is a relatively new tradition in the Western Christian churches. The known example of a Lessons and Carols service comes from England in 1880. Edward White Benson, then Anglican bishop of Turro, organized a 10pm service on Christmas Eve with readings and singing in an effort to keep the men of the area out of the pubs. The basic format of Benson's service is still used today. Readings from scripture alternate with hymns and anthems to tell the story of God's gift to the world in Jesus Christ.

Over time variations of the Lessons and Carols service have emerged. The most famous is the celebration of King's College, Cambridge on Christmas Eve. Broadcast worldwide on BBC radio and television, the King's College service of Nine Lessons and Carols tells the story of Christ's nativity in both word and song. Our service today is a version of the King's College celebration with some changes to the lessons more appropriate for the Advent season.

Whether on Christmas Eve or an Advent morning, the lessons read focus on the eternal promise of redemption through Jesus Christ. The story of Christ unfolds in the service, beginning with humanity's original sin. It is because we do sin that we are so in need of the saving grace of Jesus Christ. The lessons follow through the promise of God to Abraham and the visions of the prophet Isaiah proclaiming the coming of a savior of the people.

Since 1919 the service at King's College has begun with the processional hymn, "Once in Royal David's City." The first verse is sung by a solo boy chorister who is not told until just moments before the service begins that he is the soloist that year. When the service of lessons and carols is celebrated on Christmas Eve, the story of the birth of Christ is retold. On that night of nights, the community of faith awaits the coming of Christmas morning and the fulfillment of God's promise in the birth of the Christ child.

Because Advent is meant to be a season of expectation and anticipation of the miracle of Christmas, some texts surrounding the narrative of Jesus' birth are changed for an Advent service of Lessons and Carols. In their place, readings about John the Baptist and the angel's promise to Mary are read. During the season of Advent, the lessons and the carols help to focus our minds on the coming of Christ so that on Christmas Eve when we hear the story retold, our hearts and our minds are prepared for the wonderful event to unfold.

That light is the presence of God.


We greet a child, Emmanuel, God with us.



THE FIRST LESSON Genesis 2:4b-17, 3:8-10, 22-23

The story of creation and humanity's fall from paradise is told.

The birth of Christ.



Joseph belonged to David's house and family line, he went up from the city of Nazareth in Galilee to David's city, called Bethlehem, in Judea. He went to be enrolled together with Mary, who was promised to him in marriage and who was pregnant. While they were there, the time came for Mary to have her baby. She gave birth to her firstborn child, a son, wrapped him snugly, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the guestroom.

Nearby shepherds were living in the fields, guarding their sheep at night. The Lord's angel stood before them, the Lord's glory shone around them, and they were terrified.

The angel said, "Don't be afraid! Look! I bring good news to you—wonderful, joyous news for all people. Your savior is born today in David's city. He is Christ the Lord. This is a sign for you: you will find a newborn baby wrapped snugly and lying in a manger." Suddenly a great assembly of the heavenly forces was with the angel praising God. 
John testifies to the light of Christ.
