ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION

The Annual Meeting of the Congregation and the Corporation of the First Presbyterian Church of Lansing, Michigan, is called for **Sunday, March 10, 2024,** immediately following the morning worship service. The purpose of the meeting is to hear the Session's reports on the life, work, and financial status of the church, to receive the annual budget, and review the Pastor's Terms of Call.

LENT – SIX WEEKS OF SUNDAYS FROM ASH WEDNESDAY THROUGH PALM SUNDAY

- Lent is a time of reflection, reconciliation, and repentance. We have much to ponder in our world today and how best to reflect, encourage reconciliation, and repent of our own complicity in the struggles our world currently faces.
- Lent marks the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for his ministry, and "being tempted by the Devil." It's a time to consider how Jesus was able to reject Satan's calls to put himself above God and how often we fail to do so in our daily lives.
- We mark the Sundays in Lent with our Lenten candle ceremony to help us remember.
- On Palm Sunday, March 24, we will have palms and a play featuring Mary the Mother of Jesus' possible perspective on Holy Week events.
- On Thursday, March 28, we will observe communion and the series of events that happened during and after the Last Supper. This event is planned to be family friendly, with "stations" to observe foot or hand washing, communion, prayer and storytelling, and the commitment of our paper prayer hearts from Ash Wednesday.

- On Good Friday, March 29, there will be two opportunities to worship and remember Jesus' sacrifice. From noon until 3:00 p.m., the Lansing Clergy Forum will again host a multi-pastor approach to worship in our Sanctuary. If you have never attended one of these services, you are highly encouraged to do so! We will also host a service at 7:00 p.m. in the First Pres Sanctuary to mark Jesus's death on the cross.
- **Sunday, March 31 is Easter!** Jesus has risen from the dead and we are witnesses of this great event! We will move from a mysterious dawn to the bright light of our Risen Lord! Join us for all or some of these events!

PASTOR'S NOTE

Holy Week is just around the corner! This year we begin our observance on Palm Sunday with a breakfast from 8:30-9:30 and reader's theater production during our regular service written by our own Gwen Botting. Maundy Thursday services will be at 7:00 p.m. and might look a little bit different this year. Come and find out! On Good Friday we will have an ecumenical service with the churches of the Greater Lansing Clergy Forum from noon to 3:00 p.m. and our own regular service at 7:00 p.m. Easter Sunday we will celebrate at our regular worship time.

The following provides some helpful background on the history of Holy Week and is from the PC(USA) website:

One of the first annual events of the Christian year, after the celebration of the resurrection on every Lord's Day, was a commemoration of Christ's dying and rising at Easter. Over the years, one day was split into three different rituals to remember the Last Supper and New Commandment (Maundy Thursday), the Crucifixion (Good Friday), and the struggle to

make meaning of the cross in light of the whole of salvation history (the Great Vigil) — all culminating in Easter at daybreak.

What was originally one annual service remembering the Lord's death and resurrection became split into separate services to pay closer attention to the significant details of Christ's death and resurrection. These were considered to be part of one salvific activity

of God and thus celebrated as such without a benediction until the end of the service with the Easter announcement that "Christ is risen!"

The Three Days or Triduum (Maundy Thursday at sundown through sundown of Easter) are the most solemn of the church year. The whole church's participation is encouraged in this time of great significance for all who would be formed in the Christian faith, especially catechumens. The Great Vigil of Easter was the time set aside for the annual baptism of new Christians, coinciding with the eucharistic dawning of God's reign in the risen Lord Jesus Christ.

A continuous dramatic story: An excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship (Geneva Press, 2003, 11)

All of Holy Week points toward the passion — the death and resurrection of Christ. The week's final three days (from sunset Thursday to sunset on Easter) complete the commemoration of Christ's passion. These three days are called the Triduum.


The Triduum engages us from Thursday until Sunday in a unified act. What happens on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil forms a continuous dramatic story. These days are to be seen together rather than separately. The services for the three final days of Holy Week connect with one another and, together, comprise the oneness of the Triduum.

Because of this interrelationship of the three days, each service of the Triduum needs the others to tell the whole story. For example, resurrection is incomprehensible without Christ's self-giving in crucifixion and at the Lord's Supper. Therefore, Easter needs Good Friday and Maundy Thursday to be fully understood. The way to the triumph of Easter is through the Triduum.

All of Holy Week, and particularly its three concluding days (the Triduum), provides an opportunity to undertake a pilgrimage of renewed commitment and joy; to travel Christ's path of servanthood, through the Lord's Supper and the suffering of the cross, as we move toward Easter. Our joy during the great festival of resurrection will be enhanced by faithful participation in worship during the preceding week, especially during the whole of the Triduum.







MUSIC NOTES from Megan



Some of us have been given special ability as apostles; to others he has given the gift of being able to preach well; some have special ability in winning people to Christ, helping them to trust him as their Savior; still others have a gift for caring for God's people as a shepherd does his sheep, leading and teaching them in the ways of God.

Why is it that he gives us these special abilities to do certain things best? It is that God's people will be equipped to do better work for him, building up the Church, the body of Christ, to a position of strength and maturity; until finally we all believe alike about our salvation and about our Savior, God's Son, and all become full-grown in the Lord—yes, to the point of being filled full with Christ.

-Ephesians 4:11-13 (Living Bible Translation)

The liturgical calendar this year, requires us all to go through the bulk of Lent, then experience all of Holy Week to then burst into light on Easter morning. What an amazing journey we will be on together this month!

Your Staff, Worship Committee, Membership Committee, Christian Education Committee, and Deacons have been working hard to create a Lenten journey, a Palm Sunday, and an Easter morning that is meaningful. "WE" do not operate in a vacuum. The Lenten Bible Study, Sunday morning educational opportunities, worship service, Lenten candle readers, choir (chancel and bell), extra musicians, website workers, Egg Hunt organizers, Palm Sunday breakfast workers, the corporate prayer writers work together to create worship-filled experiences for you!

The music staff prays that the music you hear and experience during the month of March supports you on your Lenten and Holy Week journey and then bursts forth on the last day of March as we celebrate Christ's Resurrection!

WHAT'S NEW IN OUR LIBRARY?

Earth Care Resources

A new re-purposed shelf in the church's library will feature resources on the environmental and eco-justice issues. The First Pres Green Team is working on an initiative whereby our church would become certified as an "Earth Care



Congregation" through Presbyterians for Earth Care. This program strives to reduce environmental impacts through educational resources and local efforts such as recycling, conversion to solar power, and use of eco-friendly material in Worship. Our FPC Library Committee and the Green Team collaborated on providing a shelf featuring books, pamphlets, and related materials that provide insights on ways our congregation and its members can reduce poor environmental impacts on God's creation.




Tuesday March 5, 7:00 on Zoom Next Year in Havana by Chanel Cleeton



Havana, 1958. The daughter of a sugar baron, nineteen-year-old Elisa Perez is part of Cuba's high society, where she is largely sheltered from the country's growing political unrest—until she embarks on a clandestine affair with a passionate revolutionary... Miami, 2017. Freelance writer Marisol Ferrera grew up hearing romantic stories of Cuba from her late grandmother Elisa, who was forced to flee with her family during the revolution. Elisa's last wish was for Marisol to scatter her ashes in the country of her birth. Arriving in Havana, more family history comes to light and Marisol finds herself attracted to a man with secrets of his own. Discussion led by Pat Eenigenburg.


Tuesday April 2, 7:00 in the parlor Poverty, by America by Matthew Desmond (all-church read)

The United States, the richest country on earth, has more poverty than any other advanced democracy. Why? Why does this land of plenty allow one in every eight of its children to go without basic necessities, permit scores of its citizens to live and die on the streets, and authorize its corporations to pay poverty wages? Elegantly written and fiercely argued, this compassionate book gives us new ways of thinking about a morally urgent problem. It also helps us imagine solutions. Desmond builds a startlingly original and ambitious case for ending poverty. He calls on us all to become poverty abolitionists, engaged in a politics of



collective belonging to usher in a new age of shared prosperity and, at last, true freedom. Discussion led by George Bennett.

Tuesday May 7, 7:00 in the parlor Braiding Sweetgrass by Robin Wall Kimmerer



As a botanist, Robin Wall Kimmerer has been trained to ask questions of nature with the tools of science. Drawing on her life as an indigenous scientist, Kimmerer shows how other living beings—asters and goldenrod, strawberries and squash, salamanders, algae, and sweetgrass—offer us gifts and lessons, even if we've forgotten how to hear their voices. Her reflections circle toward a central argument: that the awakening of ecological consciousness requires the acknowledgment and celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world. For only when we can hear the languages of other beings will we be capable of understanding the generosity of the earth and learn to give our own gifts in return.



SESSION NOTES

The Session met on February 21, 2024 for a training session with Sallie Campbell and Kathy Banghart and regular monthly meeting.

Don Heck explained the proposed budget for this year that will be presented at the annual meeting on March 10. The church ended the year with a \$9,457 deficit. The sale of the church van for \$4600 has helped to reduce last year's deficit and another donation of \$3,000 further reduced it to \$1857.

Pam Blair thanked the church for the **Pam Blair Christian Service award**: "I want to humbly thank you for your creative and thoughtful recognition. I am honored to have an award that highlights how God calls all of us to serve others. I am also excited to know this award means nothing unless we have many names for the plates, and I am already thinking of names to place on the plaque, because this church has many who are worthy. We are called to serve, and I am glad God has called me to serve with all of you. To God goes the glory."

MISSION NOTES

Support for Displaced Lebanese Families

Thank you for your generous support for the efforts of our mission partner, the National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon (NESSL), to provide for 145 Protestant families who were displaced from six communities near the Israeli border and forced to find refuge with relatives and friends in safer parts of the country. Our mission network was able to surpass our fundraising goal of \$10,000 and send \$15,000 to Lebanon in early January. Continuous shelling back and forth across the border has emptied border villages, leaving crops unharvested and orchards untended. Even Christian communities with no Hezbollah presence have been attacked. Although there are no reports of fatalities among the Protestant families, the church building in Alma as Shaab, south of Tyre, has been damaged.
