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St. Francis of Assisi wrote his famous "Canticle of Brother Sun" in the final year of his life (1226). It is a rapturous celebration of God's creation. I find it helpful to return to it from time to time (especially in the month of January in central Michigan!)—to be reminded of the glories of God's presence in our midst (not to mention the actual existence of the sun!). Here it is, in its entirety. I hope you find it as helpful as I do!

Most High, all powerful, good Lord, Yours are the praises, the glory, the honor, and all blessing.

To You alone, Most High, do they belong, and no man is worthy to mention Your name.

Be praised, my Lord, through all your creatures, especially through my lord Brother Sun, who brings the day; and you give light through him. And he is beautiful and radiant in all his splendor! Of you, Most High, he bears the likeness. Praised be You, my Lord, through Sister Moon and the stars, in heaven you formed them clear and precious and beautiful. Praised be You, my Lord, through Brother Wind, and through the air, cloudy and serene, and every kind of weather through which You give sustenance to Your creatures. Praised be You, my Lord, through Sister Water, which is very useful and humble and precious and chaste. Praised be You, my Lord, through Brother Fire, through whom you light the night and he is beautiful and playful and robust and strong. Praised be You, my Lord, through Sister Mother Earth, who sustains us and governs us and who produces varied fruits with colored flowers and herbs.



Praised be You, my Lord, through those who give pardon for Your love, and bear infirmity and tribulation. Blessed are those who endure in peace for by You, Most High, they shall be crowned. Praised be You, my Lord, through our Sister Bodily Death, from whom no living man can escape. Woe to those who die in mortal sin. Blessed are those whom death will find in Your most holy will, for the second death shall do them no harm. Praise and bless my Lord, and give Him thanks and serve Him with great humility.

"In our celebrations of Christmas and Epiphany we rejoice in the dawning and the arising of Light in darkness. ... Epiphany not only discloses the Savior to the world but also calls the world to show forth Christ, to be witnesses to God's true Light.

The timeless mystery of the incarnation, God in flesh, leads us forth to show and tell of Christ as God's gift of grace and salvation for all persons. Some call this ongoing epiphany the work of Christmas." – From Companion to the Book of Common Worship

The word, "Epiphany" comes from, as far as I can tell, the Greek word *epiphaneia*, meaning "manifestation or striking appearance." The roots of the word give us "on, to" (*epi*) and "to show/shine" (*phainein*).

What a wonderful description of a baby, right?

Picture with me, if you can, a child discovering its hands; a child smiling at a stranger's face; a child pulling themselves up from a seated position. Aren't those moments full of "shine?"

Just as we can revel and wonder at how a baby begins to relate to the world around itself, imagine how Mary and Joseph must have felt about their baby son experiencing and

exploring the world around him, knowing the promise that lived inside Jesus. I'll give you a moment.

Wow.



Tuesday January 2, 7:00 p.m. on Zoom The Wish Book Christmas by Lynn Austin




Best friends Audrey Barrett and Eve Dawson are looking forward to celebrating Christmas in postwar America, thrilled at the prospect of starting new traditions with their five-year-old sons. But when the 1951 Sears Christmas Wish Book arrives and the boys start obsessing over every toy in it, Audrey and Eve realize they must first teach them the true significance of the holiday. They begin by helping Bobby and Harry plan gifts of encouragement and service for those in their community, starting by walking an elderly neighbor's yellow Lab—since a dog topped the boys' wish list for Santa. In the charming tale that follows, Audrey and Eve are

surprised to find their own hearts healing from the tragedies of war and opening to the possibility of forgiveness and new love. Discussion led by Elda Keaton.

General Alex Dumas is a man almost unknown today, yet his story is strikingly familiar—because his son, the novelist Alexandre Dumas, used his larger-than-life feats as inspiration for such classics as *The Count of Monte Cristo* and *The Three Musketeers*. But, hidden behind General Duma's swashbuckling adventures was an even more incredible secret: he was the son of a black slave—who rose higher in the white world of France than any man of his race prior to current times. *The Black Count* is simultaneously a riveting

BIBLE STUDY

FPC Adult Bible Study beginning Wednesday, January 3 at 7:30 pm by Zoom*



January 3 – The Epiphany of our Lord and The Baptism of Jesus (Please note, these are the lessons for both the Epiphany and the Baptism of our Lord. We will no doubt not work through each but present an overview to each set.) *The feast of Epiphany* ("manifestation") concludes the Christmas season with a celebration of God's glory revealed in the person of Jesus Christ. In Isaiah and Ephesians, that glory is proclaimed for all nations and

people. Like the light of the star that guided the magi to Jesus, the light of Christ reveals who we are: children of God who are claimed and washed in the waters of baptism. We are sent out to be beacons of the light of Christ, sharing the good news of God's love to all people.

READINGS AND PSALM

Isaiah 60:1-6 Psalm 72:1-7, 10-14 *All kings shall bow down before him. (Ps. 72:11)* Ephesians 3:1-12 Matthew 2:1-12



Our re-creation in baptism is an image of the Genesis creation, where the Spirit of God moved over the waters. Both Mark's gospel and the story in Acts make clear that it is the Spirit's movement that distinguishes Jesus' baptism from John's. The Spirit has come upon us as upon Jesus and the Ephesians, calling us God's beloved children and setting us on Jesus' mission to re-create the world in the image of God's vision of justice and peace.

READINGS AND PSALM

Genesis 1:1-5 Psalm 29 *The voice of the LORD is upon the waters. (Ps. 29:3)* Acts 19:1-7 Mark 1:4-11

January 10 – Second Sunday after the Epiphany

All the baptized have a calling in God's world. God calls not just pastors and deacons but also the youngest child, like Samuel. The story of the calling of Nathanael plays with the idea of place. Nathanael initially dismisses Jesus because he comes from Nazareth. But where we come from isn't important; it's where—or rather whom—we come to. Jesus refers to Jacob, who had a vision in a place he called "the house of God, and . . . the gate of heaven" (Gen. 28:17). Jesus says he himself is the place where Nathanael will meet God.

READINGS AND PSALM

1 Samuel 3:1-10 [11-20] Psalm 139:1-6, 13-18 You have searched me out and known me. (Ps. 139:1) 1 Corinthians 6:12-20 John 1:43-51

January 17 – Third Sunday after the Epiphany

As we continue through the time after Epiphany, stories of the call to discipleship show us the implications of our baptismal calling to show Christ to the world. Jesus begins proclaiming the good news and calling people to repentance right after John the Baptist is arrested for preaching in a similar way. Knowing that John was later executed, we see at the very outset the cost of discipleship. Still, the two sets of brothers leave everything they have known and worked for all their lives to follow Jesus and fish for people.

READINGS AND PSALM

Jonah 3:1-5, 10 Psalm 62:5-12 *God alone is my rock and my salvation. (Ps. 62:6)* 1 Corinthians 7:29-31 Mark 1:14-20



January 24 – Fourth Sunday after the Epiphany

In Deuteronomy God promises to raise up a prophet like Moses, who will speak for God; in Psalm 111 God shows the people the power of God's works. For the church these are ways of pointing to the unique authority people sensed in Jesus' actions and words. We encounter that authority in God's word, around which we gather, the word that prevails over any lesser spirit that would claim power over us, freeing us to follow Jesus.

SESSION NOTES

The Session and the Board of Deacons of First Presbyterian Church of Lansing met for their annual joint meeting at the church Wednesday, 15 November 2023. The joint meeting consisted of a potluck dinner and fellowship, then followed by the regular meeting of Session. The Rev. Stanley Jenkins presided as moderator.

The Rev. Bob Higle was invited to speak about his background and faith journey, and his wish to join First Presbyterian as an affiliate member. Session approved his membership and welcomed him to the church. The Rev. Higle joins as an affiliate (non-voting) member due to his ordination in another denomination.

Bob Higle will be welcomed in front of the congregation along with Natasha and Desmond Williams during worship December 17.

The Finance Committee expects to close the year with a deficit around \$20,000, with a few more weeks of activity to complete the year. Finance also circulated a draft budget for 2024 while new pledges are still being counted. Mark Harvey will join the Endowment Committee and David Viele will serve as Endowment Committee Chair.

The Worship, Music and Arts Committee is planning a project to display several of the many quilts made by Daisy DeHaven in Litten Hall.

The Rev. Jenkins reported that he was elected by the Presbytery of Lake Michigan to represent the presbytery at the PC(USA) General Assembly this summer.
